7 October 2018

What we've been doing

25 September 2018

Berrybank

We cut back vegetation on 2 areas and burnt cleared material on a bonfire. The aim in one area was to remove brambles and nettles so that trees could be planted. The ground surface here was extremely uneven. Group members on the other area cleared invasive plants, including holly and rhododendron.

This was a fairly eventful day: the group car had a flat tyre and refused to start; we also had a sudden explosion from the bonfire, which may have been an exploding gas canister.

We found a number of such canisters on site, these probably contained nitrous oxide (laughing gas), and are inhaled by users to obtain a "high":

2 October 2018

Tarman's Copse

We worked on Burnt House Ride, which is a medieval sunken pathway close to Tarman's Copse. There was some initial difficulty in finding the parking area in Tawny Owl Square: Jennett's Park is not at all easy to navigate.

We coppiced hazel stools by the path. The hazel had clearly been coppiced at one time, but had been neglected, and many of the stems were very thick and challenging to cut down. Suitable material was kept for binders and stakes for hedging; other material was taken away in a trailer.

Black plastic plant pots cannot be recycled at the kerbside because they are invisible to the infrared sensors used at recycling plants. The Horticultural Trades Association is supporting an initiative to move to taupe-coloured plant pots, which can be recycled at the kerbside.
